Safety Notice

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Summary

Remote Service Platform is using Remote Desktop which lets you connect to high secure Mitel Remote Service Platform via Internet, managing and maintaining customer infrastructure.

Since the Windows security update of April 2026, Microsoft has significantly tightened warnings to prevent phishing attacks.

Every time you open an RDP file, a security dialog appears before any connection is made. It shows the remote computer address and a check box for each local resource the file wants to access.

What the message means

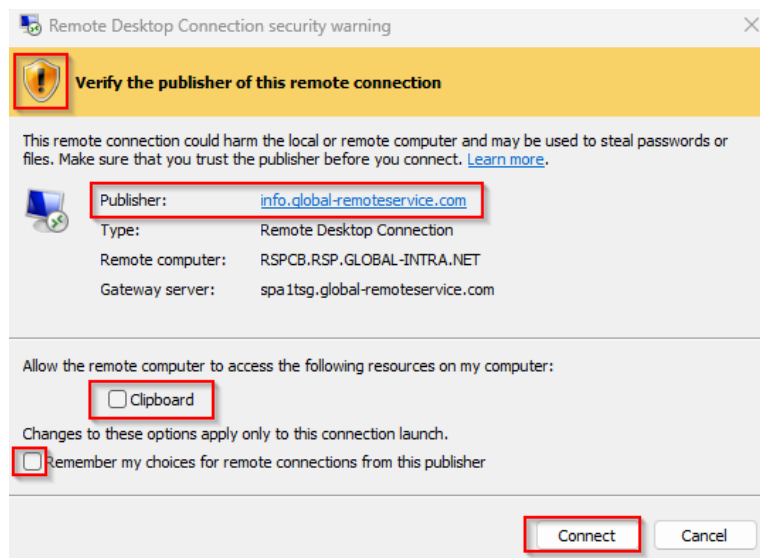
- **Verified publisher:** If a name is displayed, the RDP file has been digitally signed. This confirms that the file originates from the named organization and has not been modified since it was signed.
- **Unknown publisher:** The file is not signed. In this case, Windows cannot verify the origin. This is common with internal or user-created files but poses a security risk if the file comes from an unknown source (e.g., an email attachment).

Mitigations / Workarounds

Mitel Remote Service Platform is always using certified connections only, therefore a “verified publisher” message appears.

To verify the publisher of a remote connection (RDP file), check the digital signature in the warning prompt. A trusted connection displays a valid publisher name; if it says, "Unknown publisher," it is unsigned and potentially insecure. Ensure the signature comes from a trusted entity and hasn't been revoked.

Remote Service Platform is using the presented publisher FQDN (below) which can be trusted.



To avoid recurring message, we recommend selecting the boxes and proceed with “connect”

Clipboard: What it does: Shares the contents of your clipboard (anything you copy and paste) between your device and the remote computer.

Solution/ Recommended Action

To verify the publisher of a remote connection (RDP) file, check the digital signature in the warning dialog or review the **SHA1 thumbprint** of the certificate via [Group Policy \(gpedit.msc\)](#), as well as push the GPO to affected user clients.

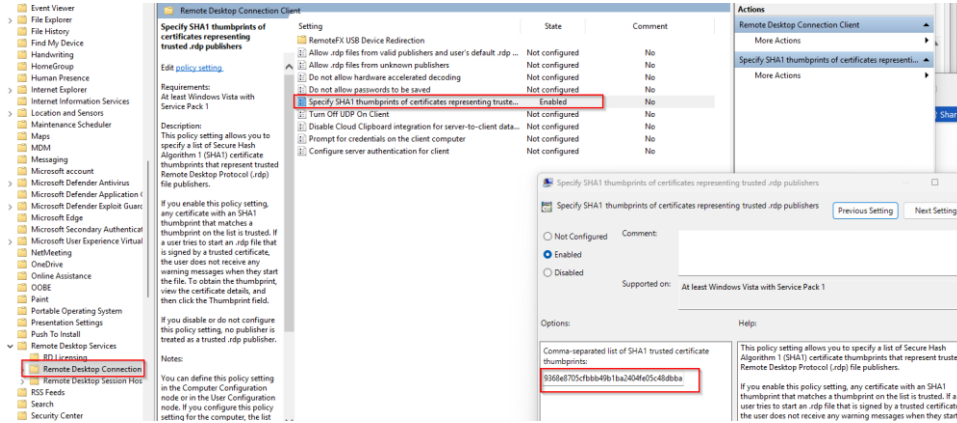
Steps to Verify or Fix Warnings for Remote Service Platform:

- Configure Trusted Publishers: Use Group Policy to import the SHA1 thumbprint of the certificate you trust. Navigate to *Computer Configuration -> Policies -> Administrative Templates -> Windows Components -> Remote Desktop Services -> Remote Desktop Connection Client* to add the certificate thumbprint.
- Audit Settings: If an RDP file is not digitally signed or does not match with issued GPO thumbprint, Windows displays a caution dialog listing the destination system again.

Add the following actual Remote Service Platform Certificate thumbprint:

9368e8705cfbbb49b1ba2404fe05c48dbbabe758

Note: the thumbprint must be replaced in case of revoked or updated Certificate as well.



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
